## Tuesday Nights at O'Leary's

This is a collection of tunes which have been played on Tuesday nights at O'Leary's during Comhaltas sessions, or after Comhaltas sessions, or when there are no Comhaltas sessions, but it is still Tuesday.

Most of the songs are trad Irish, but there are also old English country dance tunes, a modern French bouree, some Scandinavian oddities, and other interlopers, both old and new. The interlopers are labeled as to nationality and/or composer if known.

## Warnings, Cautions, and General Heads-Up

For the most part these are trad tunes, and they tend to have a life of their own. Here are the things you can count on:

- You may know the same song by another name.
- You may know the name, but to another song. The bluegrass "Mountain Dew" and the Irish "Mountain Dew" are definitely not the same; different tune, different lyrics.
- You may know the song with more or fewer notes.
- You may know the song with more or fewer parts.
- You may know it as a song, when it is actually a set, and probably vice versa.
- If you know the song, at a different session you may find that it is in a different key, with some different notes, and a different number of repeats.
- If you know the set, at a different session you may find that the first song in the set is the only one you know. Sets are not universal.

I have found variations on modern tunes where the composer is still very much alive ( Crested Hen for example), so the number of versions of an actual trad piece can make your head hurt. I found sixteen (16) versions of St. Anne's Reel at www.thesession.org, and that is only one website.

## Tempo

The tempo, when I remembered to include it, is a guide only. One persons slow air may be another persons fast jig.

## Midis

Midi files of all of the tunes and sets will be on the Comhaltas web site: www.comhaltas.ca
MuseScore can be used to change the key of a midis, as well as change the tempo.
